Course Objectives and Description

In this course you will advance your skills in writing for the media. Specifically, we will focus on writing feature stories and opinion pieces. These are two specialized forms of writing that require a different approach than other types of media writing you've done in the past.

By the end of the course, you will be able to:

- Write pitch letters for feature stories
- Develop and refine story and article ideas
- Write a variety of feature stories
- Write several types of opinion articles

Prerequisites

COMM 310: Advanced Media Writing. In this course, we will move beyond the basics that you've learned in your previous writing courses. We won't spend much time, if at all, discussing AP style or interviewing techniques: you should already know this. We will focus on the craft of writing.

Class Meetings

Because this class is online, there are no set meeting times. There are, however, assignments, readings, and lectures every week. To be successful in this course, get into a habit of logging into Blackboard at least a couple times a week. Also check your email frequently in case any changes are made.

Grading

The grading scale is non-negotiable. A final grade of 899, for instance, is a B. Late Work

Under an extreme circumstance, if you have an excused absence AND the instructor was notified in advance, an exception may be made.

Article Rewrites

In this class, you will have five major writing assignments: 3 feature stories and 2 opinion articles. Each writing assignment will be graded rigorously; however, you are allowed to rewrite each major writing assignment up to two times (except for the final writing assignment: there won't be time at the end of the semester for rewrites). Rewrites are due within **1 week** after I hand the graded assignment back to you. With each rewrite, you can earn **up to 20%** of your grade back. However, just turning in a rewrite does not guarantee you 20%. Rewrites should be substantive based on my feedback. They are more than just spelling, grammar, and punctuation edits. Rewrites may require you to go back to your sources to ask them additional questions.

Academic Honesty

All work completed for this course must respect the intellectual property of others. When using somebody else's copyrighted material, whether words, images, media, or ideas, proper credit must be given. If direct quotations are used, they must be enclosed in quotation marks and properly cited. If copyrighted material is used indirectly, it must still be properly cited!

If in doubt, include a citation. If you have any questions at all, ask your instructor *before* the assignment is submitted. *Ignorance of what constitutes plagiarism is not an excuse!*
